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In this exam there are three tasks.


You must do all three tasks.

Task 1

The *Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks* is going to be made into a film.

In the book, the author – a newspaper reporter – tells the story. The director of the film thinks it would be a better film if someone else was the narrator in the film version, but she's not sure who. So the director has asked *Focus Magazine* readers to help her.

- Which of the people in the book would you choose to be the narrator of the film and why?
- Write a couple of paragraphs.



Task 2

Ship Breaker (Part B) - a story of suspense Suspense = excitement + tension

In fiction, if you can create suspense, you keep your reader glued to your story and turning the pages. Some authors create suspense by using:

Time limits

If there is a time limit, the hero/heroine will be under pressure from the start, so quick decisions are needed.

Conflicts

Don't solve one conflict before you introduce the next one. Keep the problems coming.

Dialogue

Use dialogue with short, sharp sentences. This makes the situation more immediate and moves the story forward quickly.

Carefully chosen verbs

Verbs can convey exact sights and sounds as well as precise actions.

Machetes appeared in the dig-men's hands. They dove for Tool, snarling. One of them flew back, thrown by Tool's strength, but the other swung his machete. Blood sprayed the air, an arc of black liquid gleaming in lantern glow. Nailer cast about for a weapon, something he could throw, a club, anything –

Nita grabbed him and dragged him back. "Nailer! You can't help him!" she said. "We have to run before they see us!"

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Task 3A
